Marqua Wilson, a long-time client of Women's Center & Shelter, was murdered in cold blood by her ex-partner. He shot her in the head, while her five young children were home. Marqua was a loving mother and a spirited, strong young woman. She had fled from this abusive man several times, and was finally living in a safe, confidential place. Anyone who knew her would tell you she was working hard to re-build her life free from violence. Her ex found her because a professional didn't redact this confidential information in a document that went to him. This is unfortunately not the only time the system had failed Marqua. He wasn't jailed for any significant length of time when he kicked her door in, or beat her up repeatedly, or when he stabbed her. He is a VERY dangerous man, and if we shared with you some of the ways he terrorized Marqua and her children you wouldn't be able to sleep tonight. And now Marqua is dead, and her beautiful, sweet young children are left without a mother who loved them deeply and tried fiercely to protect them.

Despite the severity of the danger that so many of our clients experience, WC&S very rarely loses a client. Our team is devastated, utterly heart-broken, frustrated. We had all seen the light for Marqua's future, and now we worry that we'll see her traumatized children in Shelter as adult victims of a repeated cycle of intergenerational abuse. Words really can't express how sad and how angry we all are. We are hyper-vigilant and worried about the women and kids who we have served, -who are in our shelter now, those who will be with us in the future, and especially those we accept who never make it in and we can't reach and we don't know why.

Yet despite the worry, the sadness, and the anger, it is critical that our work goes on.

There are so many more Marquas. So many victims who only want peace. Who only want to be safe. Who only want a stress-free childhood for their kids. **But despite the best efforts of victims and those who work with them, we can't achieve success alone. We need your help.** Take action when you see injustice. Reach out to someone you may be worried about. Speak up when you hear something that concerns you. Don't say "just leave" when you hear a victim saying she is in an abusive relationship; instead, offer ongoing support and connection to safety planning, knowing that 73% of women who are murdered by their partners are murdered when they leave or after they've left. It takes all of us working together against injustices on the personal, systemic, and societal levels. Rest in Peace, Marqua. We will miss you, and we will work every day to honor your memory by striving for justice and by helping others like you who only want to live their lives with love, with safety, and with peace.

Group and individual therapy, resource coordination, and psychiatric services are available to all clients. We offer assistance with childcare and transportation to make treatment accessible to all women who need it.

POWER Connection provides in-home drug and alcohol assessment and peer recovery support to women, including those who may be at high risk for relapse or overdose, such as women who are pregnant or parenting, homeless, or victims of violence.

POWER values and hires individuals with lived experience. Approximately half of our nearly 60-member workforce is in recovery from addiction, collectively representing close to 400 years of recovery! Mentors—paid employees with a minimum of five years of recovery from a substance use disorder—serve as recovery and wellness coaches, modeling healthy recovery, helping clients navigate complex systems, and motivating them to remain engaged with treatment. Though peer recovery support services are rooted in POWER Connection, we have expanded the program, ensuring that mentors are available to all women receiving treatment from POWER or on our waiting list.

Interested in donating your car? Check out the charity where you are planning the donation to ensure they are a legitimate non-profit group. Obtain the reasonable value of your car – and document everything – we are talking about the government here! (document and itemize everything – every single household deduction for the year – in case of an audit.) Most charities keep the car if they need it, or provide someone in need with transportation, but some turn around and sell at auction. If this happens, your maximum tax claim can only be what the car was sold for at auction. Grab IRS publication 4303 – and someone out there thanks you.

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

PENNSYLVANIA CAMPAIGN for WOMEN'S HEALTH

For years now in Pennsylvania's legislature, the phrase 'women's health' has been code for restricting access to safe and legal abortion for poor and working women. The result is clear: Pennsylvania consistently ranks abysmally low for women's health andeconomic security across all indicators. Recently, a national analysis conducted by theInstitute for Women's Policy Research ranked Pennsylvania 31st for women's health & well-being, 31st for reproductive rights, and 23rd for employment & earnings.

In the bigger picture, the United States ranks dead last in the developed world–50th–inmaternal mortality–and Pennsylvania is in the bottom half of that dubious ranking.Additionally, maternal and infant mortality is severely stratified by race: African American women are three times as likely as white women to die as a result of pregnancy and childbirth. While alarming, these statistics shouldn't be surprising:studies show that the number of abortion

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Who Could Ever Forget His Or Her First Car?— Not Many According To A Michelin Survey

New campaign asks drivers to share their #FirstCarMoment and expand tire safety knowledge Getting the keys to your first car is a moment that people never forget. For most of us, that car – old, new or somewhere in between – represented a newfound freedom and independence. And of course, that freedom of driving

carries an enormous responsibility to stay safe on the road. A new survey commissioned by Michelin North America finds that four out of five Americans can tell you about the make or model of their first car, but only one in five (21 percent) remember the type of tires – a key contributor in road safety.

The survey also found that:

• More than half of Americans (58 percent) got their first car before age 18.

• While half (57 percent) purchased their first car themselves, more than one-third (39 percent) received it from someone else (either as a gift specifically purchased for them or as a hand-me-down).

• When thinking about their first car, one-third of Americans (33 percent) were not familiar with how to maintain tire tread, and only half (53 percent) kept a tire pressure gauge in the glove box.

While tire safety is critical to consider all year long, summer is a significant time to remind people of its importance. The period between Memorial Day and Labor Day marks the 100 Deadliest Days for teen drivers, based on accident data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and National Safety Council.

This summer, Michelin is kicking off a new effort encouraging consumers to share stories about their #firstcarmoment and learn more about the importance of tire safety.

"As a tire manufacturer focused on road safety for over 125 years, we feel we have an obligation to remind drivers that whether or not their first — or current — vehicle is in the best condition, their tires should be," said Pierre Barrard, director of marketing, Michelin North America. "Ultimately, we want to reinforce that what matters most is the safety of the driver, their car and its tires."

Accidents due to improper tire maintenance are preventable, and simple steps can save lives. Checking your tire pressure monthly with a pressure gauge and learning how to properly check tread depth are easy tasks that can help drivers correctly maintain their tires and contribute to overall vehicle safety.

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
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Focus on What Matters – 7 Tips for Limiting Distractions



Individuals living with ADHD know firsthand the challenges of being easily distracted. That being said, in this fast paced digital world we all have moments of distractibility and struggle to regain focus. Below are helpful tips for anyone for staying on track during our busy days.

1. Turn off email and text alerts on your desktop and phone. Each time these pop up or ding, your focus on the task at hand is interrupted.

2. Separate from your cell phone (if you dare) by placing it in your purse, desk drawer or better yet in a different room when you are working on project that demands your undivided attention.

3. Write down your top three goals each day and place them within site to serve as a frequent reminder of what you have decided is top priority for the day. Periodically check in with yourself to confirm your current actions are moving you towards your goal.

4. Declutter your work area. Glance at your desktop is it a workspace or a reference room (piles of papers not related to active projects)? If it's the latter, set aside some time to sort through and file or dispose of those items no longer related to active projects.

5. Mozart or other instrumental music played in the back ground can reduce distractibility and soothe the brain.

6. Get enough sleep. The average adult needs 8 hours of sleep for their brain to function at an optimal level. Turn off all screens at least 30 preferably 60 minutes before your head hits the pillow.

7. Take brain breaks when you find your attention wandering. Go outside, walk a flight of stairs, make a phone call or briefly chat with a co-worker. A little stimulation can help you regain focus.

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

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As the Russian ballerina, Grusinskaya, in the movie Grand Hotel (1932), the melodramatic actress Greta Garbo said, "I want to be alone." These words also became associated with her in her private life.But in a rare interview she clarified her intent: "I never said, 'I want to be alone.' I only said, 'I want to be left alone!' There is all the difference."

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I want to be left alone, I want to be alone...but what I don't want to be is lonely.

Sometimes women don't know how to differentiate the left alone from the alone and the lonely. Too often they think these are all the same.

But being left alone means that no one is making you crazy at the current time—not your kids, your dog, your spouse, your relatives, your boss...not the world at large. "Left alone" can happen at any moment in time and on any day, even if it is just for an hour. It can be an escape to the bathroom for a long shower; an appointment at the local salon to get your hair done; or a visit to the neighborhood spa for a massage. To make this an exceptional momentary escape, don't tell anyone where you are going. Or leave the cellphone in the car. Before you go home, stop for coffee at a quiet bistro or sit on a bench in a nearby park watching the birds or reading a book. The very joy is having some time where you are truly "left alone."

Being alone is another dimension. It is beyond just having a few moments or hours where no one bothers you. Being alone is a deliberate decision to spend time with yourself...to spend time with your thoughts. It is going on retreat. There are no cellphones allowed. It is a time to restore your sense of self and your sense of well-being. It is a necessity, and it requires a few days, not just a few hours. It requires planning: Sitters for the kids and the pets. Days off from work. Money. But the reward is worth all of the time, money, and planning efforts. The reward is a kinder, gentler, happier, healthier you. And that is a reward that all the members of the family or employees of your company can also enjoy.

Now the irony of this is that too many women think being left alone and being alone equate to being lonely. Interestingly, it is those women who are so very "not lonely" who most need the time to be left alone and need the time to be alone.

**Being lonely is depressing. Being left alone is refreshing.

**Being lonely requires therapy. Being left alone can be life changing...being alone is therapy.

**Being lonely sends some women into a tailspin where they reach out for the first (often unsuitable) relationship that shows itself. Being alone sends you into a relationship with yourself that reminds you all you have is all you need. And if some other person enters your life, they could be a nice addition.

**Being lonely is typically not a choice. Being left alone can be a quick decision...being alone is a conscious choice.

To maintain your focus, carve out some time in every day where you are left alone. To maintain your sanity, plan an extended time to be alone. To maintain a happy life, make an effort to not be lonely. Join an organization; take a class; volunteer in your community; invite a co-worker out for dinner. Enjoy the company of others...then enjoy some time alone.



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


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Inspired Women Paying it Forward – Philanthropic Networking with a Purpose From Debra Krischke

In one year's time, Diana moved to San Francisco, got married, became pregnant, and learned that her husband had stage-four malignant melanoma. Two and a half years later, while Diana was pregnant with their second child, her husband died at age 32.

Her husband had been, in Diana's words, "the family I never had." Until she met him, Diana hadn't felt she belonged anywhere. She was the child of a single mother whose addiction kept her from taking care of Diana. The only nurturing she got was from a neighbor. By sixth grade Diana was anorexic. In eighth grade she was admitted to the hospital weighing 80 pounds.

Diana realizes now that anorexia was her first addiction. "I was consumed with starving myself." She started eating again but didn't realize her eating problems were caused by underlying issues of loneliness, fear, and abandonment. At age 15 she began using marijuana and alcohol. After high school, her drinking escalated.

Diana met her future husband in college, earned her bachelor's degree in economics and taught pre-school while working on her master's in education. Later she taught high school classes to teenagers in Shuman Detention Center and the Allegheny County Jail. Her husband didn't drink so she tried to drink less. She thought she had her life together.

But after her husband died, Diana says, "I couldn't have a conversation for about a year without crying." She started drinking heavily "to be numb, to not think, to not dream." Over the next eight years Diana had two DUIs, one house arrest, and three chemical detoxes. She went through four inpatient drug and alcohol treatment programs, her children were removed from her care, and twice she woke up in a hospital emergency room with no idea how she got there. She completed every drug and alcohol treatment program she was in successfully but relapsed immediately afterward. When her Children, Youth, and Families caseworker talked her into going into POWER Outpatient, Diana told her POWER therapist, "There really is nothing you can do for me." The therapist answered, "Let's see how it goes."

Here's how it went: This time Diana didn't relapse. She liked POWER and felt comfortable in a setting where the clients are all women. She found that other clients' stories and paths were similar to hers and that she related to staff members who are in recovery themselves. Her therapist helped her work through her feelings of being neglected as a child and the pain of losing her husband.

Today Diana has three years clean and sober and lives with her two children. She works as a service coordinator at a social Today Diana has three years clean and sober and lives with her two children. She works as a service coordinator at a social service agency, writes a blog, and belongs to the POWER Alum Association. She is grateful to POWER for changing her whole outlook. "I arrived at POWER in black and white," Diana says, "and left in color.

**Many women who use drugs have had troubled lives. Studies have found that at least 70 percent of women drug users have been sexually abused by the age of 16. Most of these women had at least one parent who abused alcohol or drugs.

******Often, women who use drugs have low self-esteem, little self-confidence, and feel powerless. They often feel lonely and are isolated from support networks.

Women and Estate Planning Basics

When it comes to estate planning, women have unique concerns. The fact is that women live an average of 4.8 years longer than men*. That's important because it means that there's a greater chance that you'll need assets to last for a longer period of time and a greater need to plan for incapacity.

What is an estate plan?

An estate plan is a map that reflects the way you want your personal and financial affairs to

be handled in case of your incapacity or death. It allows you to control what happens to your property if you die or become incapacitated.

• Living will – a document that lists the type of medical treatment you would want, or not want, under particular circumstances.

• Durable power of attorney for health care (health-care proxy) – lets one or more family members or other trusted individuals make medical decisions for you.

• Do not resuscitate (DNR) order – a legal form, signed by both you and your doctor that gives hospital staff permission to carry out your wishes.

There are also tools that help others manage your property when you are unable to, including:

• Joint ownership – allows another person to have the same access to the property as you do. For example, if you and your spouse have a joint checking account and you become incapacitated, your spouse would still be able to make mortgage payments on time.

• Durable power of attorney – lets you name family members or other trusted individuals to make financial decisions or transact business on your behalf, even if you are disabled, or perhaps because you are disabled.

• Living trust – a successor trustee can step into your shoes to manage property in the trust if something should happen to you.

Wills and Probate

A will is quite often the cornerstone of an estate plan.

Whether or not you have a will, some property passes automatically to a joint owner or to a designated beneficiary. For example, you can transfer property such as IRAs, retirement plan benefits, and life insurance by naming a beneficiary.

A trust is a versatile estate planning tool that can protect against incapacity; avoid probate; minimize taxes; allow professional management of assets; provide safeguards for minor children, elderly parents, and other beneficiaries; and protect assets from future creditors. irrevocable.

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TITHING: WHAT, WHY, WHO and HOW Bonnie V DiCarlo

You often hear and read about money: earning, saving and investing. This article is about giving away your money. Definition: Tithing is a one-tenth part of something. So when we talk about personal tithing, we mean that you give away one tenth of your earnings.

You might ask: "Why would I do that?"

My answer is we have a human obligation to leave things better than we found them. I'm talking about here, now, wherever we are. You might think I'm saying to contribute 10% of your earnings to a religious institution of your choice. This is one possibility. There are, however, many ways to tithe. This region has many non profit organizations that, sadly, feed, house, clothe and counsel women, men and children who do not have the money to take care of these basic needs. Make one or more of these needed organizations to be the recipient of your 10%.

There are many ways to fulfill your tithing. Make a direct contribution, attend a fundraising event, set up a scholarship, adopt a family or student, name a non profit in your will. I'm certain you can list many more ways to give away 10% of your earnings. Be creative - remember we are all in this together!

Perhaps 10% is impossible at this stage of your life. Start with three percent, and raise it one percent every two years. We all have our own needs to take care of. And we must do that.

But if we are fortunate to have learned, and are now earning, let's remember to share with others and make this a "better place than we found it."

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Women Die from "Real Heart Disease" including a 'Broken Heart' Sunita Pandit



More women die of heart attack than any other cause including Breast Cancer. Heart disease is not limited to or more prevalent with men. According to cdc.gov, heart disease is the leading cause of death for women in the United States, killing 292,188 women in 2009. Almost two-thirds (64%) of women who die suddenly of coronary heart disease have no reported previous symptoms. "Broken Heart" deaths occur when a women experiences a major emotional loss such as the death of a spouse.

Women are more likely than men to have heart attack symptoms unrelated to chest pain, such as: neck, jaw, shoulder, upper back or abdominal discomfort, shortness of breath, right arm pain, nausea or vomiting, sweating, lightheadedness or dizziness, unusual fatigue. Even if you think you have no symptoms, you may misunderstand them and dismiss these risks for heart disease. Very often women will think they have the flu or are just feeling out of sorts. Ladies, if you have any of these symptoms, please err on the side of caution and seek medical assistance.

More women than men have diabetes, obesity, and history of stroke, heart failure, renal failure and depression. Researchers surveyed 2,990 women and men from an international study of heart attack patients 18-55 years old. They used general health measures and a disease-specific questionnaire that assessed patients' chest pain and lifestyle prior to their heart attacks. They found that women had poorer physical and mental health with more physical limitations prior to their heart attacks than similar-aged men with heart attacks.

There is some temporary good news, women have youthful hormonal protection and onset of heart disease usually happens 10 years later in life than men. Studies show that post-menopause, women have an increased risk of heart disease. This is because of decreasing levels of the female hormone estrogen during menopause which process begins around age 50. The hormone Estrogen creates higher levels of high-density lipoprotein (HDL or "good cholesterol") and lower levels of low-density lipoprotein (LDL or "bad cholesterol"). When natural estrogen decreases during menopause, this leads to lower "good cholesterol" and higher "bad cholesterol" increasing the risk of heart disease. Today increased life expectancy for women in the United States is 79 years, so women can expect to live a longer part of their lives with an increased risk of heart disease.

A Holistic Approach to Mental Health Wellness

Examining 4 components to maintain a balanced lifestyle

We live best when we are in balance! Oftentimes life can come at us fast; resulting in most of us losing our center in search of balance. Most of us seek work-life balance and when one facet dominates our lives we can become imbalanced. As a mental health professional, I have learned that treating patients from a holistic approach is imperative to get to the core of the problem and assist them in developing or enhancing the tools to manage life's complexities. **There are many components that factor into treating the whole person.**

Physical Wellness: This may be the most important area to obtaining mental health wellness. Before we can address the other components, we must he aware of any physical symptoms that may be affecting an individual's ability to function. Assessing the physical symptoms before the mental health symptoms is essential. Most patients present with physical symptoms that mirror mental health disorders such as anxiety and depression (problems sleeping, loss of appetite, panic attacks, and shortness of breath). When this occurs, patients should be referred to their primary medical doctor to rule out any medical conditions before continuing mental health treatment.

Some questions to consider:

How much sleep are you getting at night? Do you exercise regularly? Are you getting proper nutrition? Do you see your doctor regularly?

Emotional Wellness: People in good emotional health are not exempt from adversity. However, they are resilient, having the ability to recover effectively from illness, change or misfortune. Emotional wellness is the groundwork for what is necessary for identifying and nurturing your feelings, your intellect and your conscious inner-being. Some strategies for enhancing our emotional wellness include Positive affirmations, practicing self-love, find a hobby, don't be afraid to say no, and don't be afraid to say yes, practice forgiveness.

Emotional health also involves the people around you. Conduct an inventory of the people you spend the most time around.

Are they supportive? Do they challenge you? Are they draining or discouraging?

Mental/Psychological Wellness: Individuals who have good mental and psychological health are able to use their cognitive and emotional capabilities to function in society and meet the day to day demands of life. If an individual finds himself or herself suffering from symptoms such as difficulty sleeping, lack of appetite, feelings of hopelessness that persist for several days, irritability, suicidal thoughts, hallucinations (hearing voices), delusions seek medical attention immediately. Again, medical conditions should be ruled out before patients begin treatment with a mental health professional. Most mental health disorders are a result of chemical imbalances and some are genetic. When an individual has a chemical imbalance, he or she may have a mental health disorder. Seeking mental health treatment is extremely important in assisting individuals in tapping into their strengths to enhance their coping skills in order to manage their conditions. It is also important to take any medication prescribed by your doctor and report all side effects in counseling and to your doctor. Do not stop taking medications without speaking to your doctor. Other strategies for enhancing our mental and psychological wellness include joining a support group, journaling, reading a self-help book and practicing relaxation techniques.

Spiritual Wellness: The activity we engage in to find and nurture a sense of connection to a higher power and deeper meaning for our lives. Spiritual wellness involves the values and beliefs that provide meaning and purpose in our lives. A huge part of spiritual wellness is understanding "Who Am I?" When the gap between whom we are versus whom we think we are narrows; we begin to have good spiritual health. The process of spiritual wellness also includes what is real within our own experiences on our journeys to discover our truths. Consider the following questions for developing spiritual wellness:

Do you make time for relaxation in your day?

Do you make time for meditation or prayer in your day?

Do your values align with your decisions and actions?

Do you accept the values and views of others?

When treating the whole person, the goal is to assist individuals in finding balance in each facet of their lives. It may take time before one is ready to divulge the information needed to take the steps to achieve the desired results. There are many different ways to assist individuals in achieving this goal, but the one variable that does not change is meeting individuals where they are!



Benefit from Meditation

As a medium, meditation is important for my vocation. However, you don't have to be a medium to benefit from it! By clearing the mind of daily clutter and going inward, many studies have shown that meditation is healthy to mind, spirit, and body.

There are a couple of myths to dispel, which gives excuses for people to not meditate.

The first one is time. Many feel that meditation has to take a long time. I've sat in a number of mediumship development mediation groups over the years where we did almost an hour of mediation. Usually, it became nap time for me. When I started taking mediumship classes with some excellent mediums, they taught that these lengthy sessions were unnecessary. In fact, one of these teachers had us sit on the edge of the seat to prevent us from going too deep! They would guide us through 5-10 minute meditations before doing our exercises. This added up to 30+ minutes of meditation total.

This brings me how to use this in daily life with a number of mini meditations. One good piece of advice I got was to turn the morning shower into the a session by imagining the water as streams of light coming from the fixture.

There are pauses that can be taken during the day, like a short walk to just enjoy the surroundings while focusing on breathing. Be creative! There are meditations on YouTube that are 5 minutes to over 2 hours. I find that the 10-15 minute ones suit me fine. About once a week I might do a 20-30 minute one, but no longer!

This brings me to the second myth of silently blanking the mind. I tried doing this, and eventually found I do better with guided meditations. There are those who prefer total silence. There are no rules. Experiment and see what works best for you. When I select a guided meditation, I go to the mediumship category. There are many options, like building abundance, self-esteem, sleeping better, grief, meeting spirit guides, etc. I highly recommend that you include spirit guides in guided meditations. These guided meditations help you discover who they are and how they can help you.

Experiment, have fun, and enjoy the journey!

Sjogren's (Sho-Grins) Syndrome, You Could Have It and Not Even Know It!

It is very typical to see the globally recognized pink ribbons in almost any setting or location. We all recognize that the pink ribbon



has become the icon to represent breast cancer and all of the many stories that go with it.

Would you be surprised to learn that there is an autoimmune disease that affects women more than breast cancer? 3.2 million women have or have had breast cancer, while 3.6 million women have Sjogren's Syndrome, both diagnosed and undiagnosed.

Sjogren's Syndrome is a chronic autoimmune inflammatory disease in which the moisture-producing glands are damaged, significantly decreasing the quantity and quality of saliva and tears. While the disease was first identified by Henrik Sjogren in 1933, even in present day, few people have even heard of Sjogren's.

Although, the hallmark symptoms are dry eyes and dry mouth, Sjogren's may also cause dysfunction of other organs, affecting the kidneys, gastrointestinal system, blood vessels, lungs, liver, pancreas, and the nervous system. Patients may experience fatigue and joint pain and are at a higher risk of Lymphoma. Sjogren's Syndrome can be very disabling and is now

approved for disability through Social Security for those who are severely affected.

Sjogren's Syndrome is one of the most prevalent autoimmune disorders, striking as many as 4,000,000 Americans. Nine out of ten women are women. About half of the time Sjogren's Syndrome occurs alone, and the other half it occurs in the presence of another connective tissue disease such as rheumatoid arthritis, lupus and scleroderma.

One of the real challenges with diagnosing Sjogren's in patients is that the symptoms are diverse, appear and disappear, and are easily explained away.

Symptoms vary from person to person but may include a dry, gritty or burning sensation in the eyes; dry mouth; difficulty talking or chewing, or swallowing; a sore or cracked tongue; dry or burning throat; dry peeling lips; a change in taste or smell; increased dental decay; joint pain; vaginal and skin dryness; digestive problems; dry nose and fatigue.

The average age of diagnosis is the late 40's, although it can occur in all age groups (including in children) and in both sexes.

Equally challenging, is that Sjogren's Syndrome is often misdiagnosed or under diagnosed. The Sjogren's symptoms mimic those of menopause, drug side effects or medical conditions such as lupus, rheumatoid arthritis, fibromyalgia, chronic fatigue syndrome and multiple sclerosis. Because all symptoms are not always present at the same time and because Sjogren's can involve several body systems, physicians and dentists sometimes treat each symptom individually and do not recognize that a systemic disease is present. The average time from the onset of symptoms until diagnosis is over six years and sometimes many years.

Sjogren's is diagnosed by eye tests and blood tests. However, one can still have Sjogren's in the absence Sjogren's antibodies in the bloodwork.

Recent studies reported by Dr. Juluis Birnbaum of Johns Hopkins Hosptal have indicated that researchers are finding that when patients with a Fibromyalgia diagnosis undergo a skin biopsy, that they actually have Sjogren's Syndrome. Sjogren's Syndrome is a disease of the small nerve fibers.

On June 3, 2015 The nTIDE Jobs Report stated that among workers ages 16-64, the 4,247,000 workers with disabilities represented 3.0 percent of the total 140,116,000 workers in the U.S.

"That statistic is not good news", stated Bonnie Rubin, Program Administrator for Volunteers of America. "Although May's National Trends in Disability Employment – Monthly Update (nTIDE), issued by Kessler Foundation and University of New Hampshire's Institute on Disability (UNH-IOD) reports that the labor force participation for people with disabilities has increased from 25.3 to 27%, it still only represents 3% of the total workforce."

She goes on to say that, "on July 26, 1990 our nation committed itself to eliminating discrimination against people with disabilities and creating a future in which all doors are open to equality of opportunity, full participation, independent living, integration and economic self-sufficiency for persons with disabilities. Yet that survey reveals that only 3% of the total workers are people with disabilities. As we celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities ACT there is much more work to do and Volunteers of America of Pennsylvania is doing that work."



Plan ahead to make pets comfortable during the move *by Dottie Coll*

Pets can get stressed during a move, but extra care and consideration can make the transition easier.

According to the National Council on Pet Population Study and Policy, moving is one of the most common reasons a pet is given to an animal shelter and the No. 1 reason why a dog is given away. The lack of knowledge about pet care and relocation often leads to people to leave their pet behind.

The experts at TWO MEN AND A TRUCK® and www. hsus.org offer a few tips to make the move easier for pet owners:

Before the move:

• Remember to update pet's tags and information with the new address and contact information as soon as possible.

• Visit the veterinarian to get a physical and a copy of the pet's medical history.

• Keep pets contained when movers are present and while traveling to prevent injuries or runaway animals. **Cats:**

• Before and after the move, surround the cat with familiar objects — feeding and water bowls, toys, blanket or bed.

• Gradually introduce them to the new home by restricting them to one or two rooms at first.

Dogs:

• Slowly introduced to the new surroundings – dogs

should be leashed outside until comfortable with the area. • Consider arranging a friend or pet sitter to come over for a couple hours a day to ease the dog's anxiety if you are unable to stay home the first few days.

Fish:

• Traveling is the most difficult part of the moving process for fish. Place in bags with a mix of new water and clean water from their aquarium – the less the fish are crowded the better. Put rubber bands around the top and place the bags inside a dark, insulated cooler.

• Let the filter run for a few hours before putting fish back in the tank. Try to limit time away from the normal habitat to less than 48 hours.

Birds:

Make sure to use appropriate sized carriers for birds. Cover the bottom with litter. Secure the door with a clip from the outside. Keep cool and protected from the sun.
Bring a supply of old food and water – gradually switching from old to new supplies.

In 2015, Volunteers of America combined our two long-standing and successful Pittsburgh employment programs for people with disabilities (Project for Freedom and Working Order) into one comprehensive continuum of service titled Workforce Development Program. We standardized and replicated this more comprehensive employment program which will run in both Pittsburgh and Harrisburg beginning September 14, 2015.

Our employment driven education-to-work approach focuses on the needs of the employer or the marketplace and provides the right training to prepare individual candidates for traditional or self workemployment. This umbrella of servicesWe also offers an alternative self-employment path in Pittsburgh with a small business incubator in Pittsburgh to train provide resources for entrepreneurs to be competitive in the marketplace.

The Workforce Development Program is supported by service fees, foundation grants, private contributions and in-kind donations. We serve people who are part of the 12-19% of the general population who report having disabilities and disadvantages, those with challenges to employment, and others who experience long-term dependence on public assistance leaving them socioeconomically disadvantaged. Adult participants are unemployed or underemployed due to military service, a disability, a disease, an accident or another life-changing circumstance. Program participants come from all walks of life, are motivated to work and will be able to demonstrate that their skills and abilities outweigh their disability or disadvantagechallenges in the competitive marketplace.

The primary goal of the Workforce Development Program is to address the issue of high unemployment of people with disabilities. We offer motivated individuals the opportunity to become successful, competitively employed workers. This program is uniquely positioned to be a "one stop shop" offering the training necessary to prepare candidates to fill employer and marketplace needs. Our multiple-pronged approach to training is available to individuals based on their needs and desired outcomes. Volunteers of America of Pennsylvania identifies this approach to workforce training and development and our focus on business directed training for adults and youth as a direct pathway to increased, secure and sustainable employment.

Individuals with disabilities and disadvantages often struggle with the inflexible parameters of traditional employment requirements, have limited incomes and lack access to supportive services and resources. Volunteers of America's Workforce Development Program targets three distinct audiences: adults with disabilities and disadvantages; youth (ages 16-21) who have disabilities; and employers. It is our belief that employers need to be part of our target population for training. This approach methodology will help to change predisposed attitudes and prejudices about people with disabilities and those who may be disadvantaged as well as help to modify hiring practices that may exclude very capable and talented individuals who happen to have a disability.

The majorities of participants are referred through the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR) and are on SSI and/or SSDI. Some referrals are made through our corporate partners, agency, or organization partners and some participants are self-referred.

The process begins with assessment providing baseline soft skills data for each participant and the capability to track progress. The assessment measures multiple skills including reading, listening, math, writing, speaking with relevant items focused on real-life skills and competencies, such as resumes, bills and paychecks. Learners receive immediate feedback that enables them to focus their time and effort on a program best suited to their needs. Outcomes include competitive and self-employment success.

While our community struggles to address the unequal challenges that individuals with disabilities, veterans, and others experience in finding longterm employment, it is more important than ever to support opportunities for employment for all. In July 2015, The U.S Department of Labor Office of Disability Employment Policy reported a 10.4% unemployment rate for people with disabilities—almost twice the 5.4% unemployment rate for people without disabilities. The average unemployment rate for veterans is 4.7%, with 59% of these individuals being over the age of 45. Although the Workforce Development Program does not guarantee each student a position upon completion of the program, we do guarantee that we will actively support our graduates helping students secures employment or launch a business.

Through community outreach, capacity building and plans for service expansion, Volunteers of America of Pennsylvania is committed to providing people in need with the necessary support, skills training, and access to computer technology that lead to individual empowerment, self-sufficiency, and stability.

With help from community donations, Foundations, Grants, Government Funding, family and friends of people with disabilities, we move forward instilling hope for those who have experienced disruption in their life plan and seeking employment for all who can work.

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

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Why is green tea so good for you? "It's all about the catechin content," says Beth Reardon, RD, a Boston nutritionist. Catechins are antioxidants that fight and may even prevent cell damage. Green tea is not processed much before it is poured in your cup, so it is rich in catechins. Green tea's antioxidants may interfere with the growth of bladder, breast, lung, stomach, pancreatic, and colorectal cancers; prevent clogging of the arteries, burn fat, counteract oxidative stress on the brain, reduce risk of neurological disorders like Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases, reduce risk of stroke, and improve cholesterol levels.

White tea: Uncured and unfermented. One study showed that white tea has the most potent anticancer properties compared to more processed teas.

Oolong tea: In an animal study, those given antioxidants from oolong tea were found to have lower bad cholesterol levels. One variety of oolong, Wuyi, is heavily marketed as a weight loss supplement, but science hasn't backed the claims.

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

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

Patching Holes

Have a hole in your wall, from nails or a bird that likes to eat walls? Here is a quick easy fix:

*Get a ready-made drywall patch. Clean up the edges of the hole. *Cut or shape the patch carefully to fit the hole. Make sure to leave extra backing all around the patch to attach to the drywall surrounding the hole.

*Clean and dry the repair area

Apply the patch to the wall and smooth the taped edges with your putty knife.

*Use a wide-blade putty knife to spread a thin topcoat of joint compound over the area surrounding the repair.

*Apply a liberal amount of non-shrink joint compound with a putty knife. (a wide knife works best)

*Smooth the compound with the putty knife. Pull the blade toward you in one steady, smooth motion

*Let the patched area dry thoroughly before applying additional coats or sanding.

Once the compound is dry, lightly sand the area smooth using drywall sandpaper attached to a drywall sander. If there are large blobs or strips, shave these off with the putty knife first. You want to create as little dust as possible.

Hide minor imperfections with an ultra-thin topcoat of joint compound. Apply this topcoat over pin holes or hairline cracks as if you were trying to scrape it all off with your knife without leaving any behind. With experience, this step can often be accomplished without additional sanding.

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Tool Maintenance



Storing and cleaning your garden tools properly will prolong their life and will in fact, save you money. When spring comes, which can't be too soon, the tools will be ready for use, no need to spend time cleaning off the dirt from last year.

*First thing to do is hose off any excess dirt, pry it off of needed. Pruners and loppers may need debris removed from pivot points. Sap can be cleared off with steel wool or rubbing alcoholmake sure to let the tools dry thoroughly.

*File off any chips or dents on the working edge of shovels, spades and trowels with a coarse file, then smooth with a honing tool or fine file. Remove any rust with steel wool.

*Sharpen bladed tools by following the original angle of the blade's bevel, using a diamond honing tool. If your blade is very dull or chipped you'll need to start with a coarse honing tool, then progress to a medium and fine tool.

*If wood handles are rough, sand smooth, then rub with linseed oil. Keeping your wood-handled tools oiled in winter will keep them from splitting and cracking in the dry air of winter.

*Now that your tools are ready for storage, coat the metal parts lightly with vegetable oil or WD-40 and store in a dry place. In spring they'll be clean, sharp and ready to go!

INFLAMMATORY BREAST CANCER

Inflammatory Breast Cancer is a unique and uncommon type of breast cancer. It does not produce a distinct mass or lump that can be felt within the breast. The lack of a lump or mass also makes inflammatory breast cancer difficult to detect by mammograms. Symptoms may include:

- One breast larger than the other
- Red or pink skin
- Swelling
- Rash (entire breast or small patches)
- Orange-like texture (peau d' orange)
- Skin hot to the touch
- Pain and/or itchiness
- Ridges or thickened areas of breast
- Nipple discharge
- Nipples that appear inverted or flattened
- Swollen lymph nodes under the armpit
- Swollen lymph nodes of the neck (sometimes)

If one or more symptoms continue for more than a week talk to a physician with experience with this particular type of breast cancer.

Lupus is a chronic, inflammatory disease that can affect any and/or all parts of the body. In this autoimmune disease, the healthy tissues are attacked by an immune system that has gone awry. Also known as Systemic Lupus Erythematosus, there is currently no know cause or cure for it. BUT there is treatment.

Lupus may occur in males or females at any age, but young women between the ages of 15 and 45 are most likely to develop it. African American, Hispanic, Asian and Native American women have the greatest incidence. Between 1.4 to 2 million people have been diagnosed with lupus the United States. Lupus can be difficult to diagnose because the symptoms can come and go and often mimic other illnesses.

The person you have encountered may be a victim of human trafficking.

The National Human Trafficking Resource Center can help you determine if- you have encountered victims of human trafficking- identify local resources available to help victims-and coordinate with local social service organizations to assist victims so they can begin the process of restoring their lives.

The following clues may help you identify a possible trafficking victim:


- · Accompanied by a controlling person or boss; not speaking on his or her own behalf
- · Lack of control over personal schedule, money, I.D., travel documents
- Transported to or from work; lives and works in the same place
- Debt owed to employer/crew leader; inability to leave job
- Bruises, depression, fear, overly submissive

These Questions may help you identify a trafficking victim:

- What type of work do you do?
- Are you being paid?
- Can you leave your job if you want to?
- Can you come and go as you please?
- Have you or your family been threatened?
- What are your working and living conditions like?
- Where do you sleep and ear?
- Do you have to ask permission to eat/sleep/go to the bathroom?
- Are there locks on the doors/windows so you cannot get out?
- Has your identification or documentation been taken from you?

Many victims may be afraid to talk to you. Do not try to take care of the situation on your own.

In 2000, the Allegheny County Area Agency on Aging (formerly the Allegheny County Department of Aging) joined four other County program offices to become part of an integrated Department of Human Services. The primary objective of the Department of Human Services is to ensure a coordinated human services system that improves, increases, and promotes services to the county's general public and, in particular, to its most vulnerable populations. The Area Agency on Aging (AAA, aka Triple A) is the program office of the Allegheny County Department of Human Services that provides services for adults, 60 years of age and older. AAA provides a wide range of services designed to help older adults live quality lives, including assisting them, if they prefer, to remain living in their own homes as long as possible. AAA provides services through programs based at its Downtown Pittsburgh office, two regional staff offices and through a network of more than 100 service organizations and local municipal governments throughout the county. AAA services range from those for active, independent older adults to those for persons who are more frail and vulnerable.

A call to the SeniorLine, weekdays between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., connects the caller to a AAA care manager who will answer his/her questions about services for older adults and offer assistance in finding local providers of needed services. Callers who leave a message after normal office hours or on weekends will have their call returned by a care manager.

The care manager explains the services available throughout the AAA and its network of community providers. If appropriate, s/he arranges for an in-depth assessment of the needs of the older adult. The assessment leads to the development of a care plan in cooperation with the older adult and his/ her family, if desired.

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
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
